

<u>Status of Admissions (2016-17) to Maritime Programmes</u> <u>in the Indian Maritime University</u>

Even though the global shipping industry has been going through a prolonged recession/slowdown since 2009, and a recent annual survey by the international law firm Norton Rose Fulbright has stated that the shipping industry is currently in the grip of the worst recession in living memory and things can only improve from hereon, the number of applicants for IMU's Online Common Entrance Test (CET) as well as IMU's Online Counselling and the number of U.G & P.G admissions to IMU Campuses, year-on-year, from the Academic Year 2014-15 onwards have been showing a healthy upward trend.

The total number of candidates registered for IMU's Online CET increased from 14,751 in 2014-15 to 16,694 in 2015-16 to 22,495 in 2016-17.





Similarly, the total number of candidates registered for IMU's Online Counselling increased from 1,603 in 2014-15 to 1,966 in 2015-16 to 2,977 in 2016-17, despite the fact that from 2016-17 onwards the Online Counselling has been restricted to IMU's Campuses only and Affiliated Institutes have been excluded.




The total number of students admitted to IMU Campuses has increased from 740 in 2014-15 to 804 in 2015-16 to 975 in 2016-17.

Thus there is a considerable increase in admissions to all Campuses and in respect of almost all courses this academic year.







The total number of admissions made to IMU's Affiliated Institutes has also shown a significant increase from 1775 in 2015-16 to 1859 in 2016-17.
